


# Nappa's Goldwing's 30th Birthday Bash



Now you've all heard the famous saying It's an old and oft' quoted line, But I have to asterisk the thing To keep the poem in rhyme.\*\*\*


I'm widely experienced on both accounts And occasionally known to skite, Well the CX is no damn exception. The tits bit? I'm not game to write!!

Now I've ranted and raved and waffled About bikes and birds and things, But my next move is Saint Peter And a pair of those gossamer wings.


